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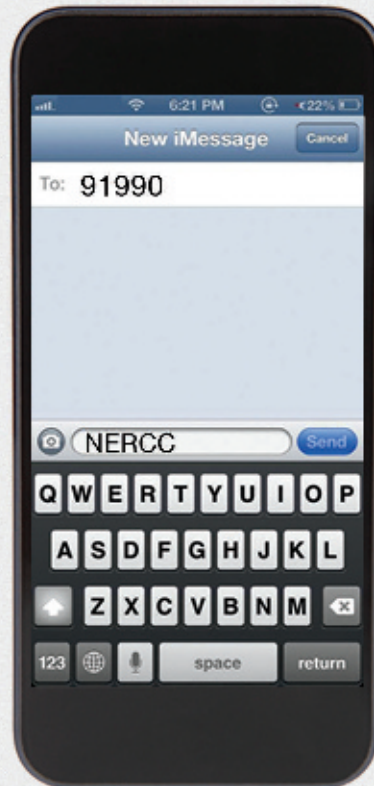

FLYNN NAMED NEW LEADER

of New England Carpenters Union

The executive board of the New England Regional Council of Carpenters has named Thomas J. Flynn executive secretary-treasurer following the recent retirement of Mark Erlich. Flynn was sworn in to the position on March 1.

For the past five years, Flynn had been serving as the national political director for the United Brotherhood of Carpenters. For seven years previously, he was the regional political director for NERCC and the executive director of the New England Carpenters Labor-Management Program (NECLMP). He has held a position on the NERCC Executive Board since 2010.

“It is a tremendous honor to return to Boston to work with my Brothers and Sisters in New England on a full-time basis, and I am grateful to the executive board for the opportunity,” Flynn said following his appointment.

Erlich served as the head officer of the New England Regional Council of Carpenters for

nearly twelve years prior to his retirement. He served on the executive board of the council since its formation in 1996. He announced his retirement in an email to staff, delegates and others.

“After 42 years as a member of the Carpenters union, 25 years as a full-time officer, and 12 years as the head of the Council, I have decided to move on,” he said.

“I am incredibly proud of the work that we have accomplished. Over the last decade, we built a progressive 21st century union at the council, winning good contracts for our members, advocating for working people across the region, and playing a major role in the area construction industry and political community.

“We have navigated through multiple challenges – a staggering recession, the growth of the underground economy, the broad-based attacks on unions and workers, and a threatening political environment – and have emerged stronger and more effective than ever.”

Flynn thanked Erlich for his service and complimented him on his dedication to the union.

“Mark Erlich set a very high standard for our union and has improved the lives of thousands and thousands of trades workers,” he said. “He helped not only members of the Carpenters union, but so many other workers in our industry who were vulnerable. Mark

and I worked together for a long time and I'll always be grateful for the experience of working with and for such a talented and dedicated labor leader. I hope to be able to take the strong foundation he built and strengthen it."

Flynn said his mix of experience has given him the benefit of different perspectives and approaches, which he looks forward to bringing to his new role.

Flynn is a 30-year member of the Carpenters union and a native of Dorchester. He now resides in Milton with his family. One of his sons is currently a third-year apprentice carpenter.

While previously working for NERCC, Flynn was the regional manager for affiliated local

"Working with the UBC on a national basis for five years gave me an opportunity to learn from a wide variety of people," he said, "from carpenters and union leaders, to contractors, subcontractors and developers and of course lobbyists, candidates and elected officials.

"On a national, regional and local level, the Carpenters union is well-prepared to serve the industry. We are unique in that we serve so many different roles. We are primarily representatives of our fellow union members on the job, at the negotiating table and in administration of training and benefit funds. But we have valuable, cooperative partnerships with signatory contractors, which help both the contractors and members.

"We advocate for unrepresented workers and help them seek justice from industry enforcement agencies. But we are also active participants in our local communities, lending our time and our skills for everything from charitable building projects to coaching youth sports.

"The strength of our organization is the skill and dedication of our 19,000 members. We look forward to developing new programs to actively engage them. As a union, we will work to generate more work opportunities and improve standards for all carpenters in the region. We need to work with the entire

unions in the Boston area. He has been a Trustee for the New England Carpenters Combined Benefit Funds and apprenticeship funds.

Following his appointment as executive secretary-treasurer, Flynn made the following appointments and assignments:

Mynor Perez was appointed to fill a vacant spot on the NERCC Executive Committee. Perez is a regional manager for specialty trades in New England, which represent floor coverers, residential wood frame carpenters, pile drivers and mill shop workers.

John Murphy was named chief of staff, a newly created position at NERCC, and will also serve as regional manager for the Boston commercial carpentry local unions.

Jack Donahue is now the director of the NERCC Market Opportunity Fund, a program that helps union contractors bid competitively in targeted markets or locations. Donahue also remains regional manager for commercial carpentry local unions in Central and Western Massachusetts.

Steve Joyce will serve as the executive director of the New England Carpenters Labor-Management Program. He will also continue as political and legislative director for the region.

Comings and Goings at NERCC

The New England Regional Council has hired new staff to help the union uphold industry standards and service members and signatory contractors. All members applying for servicing and organizing positions with the council must first participate in a three-day training and evaluation session at the UBC's International Training Center in Las Vegas. The program was developed by the UBC and uses experienced staff from throughout the Brotherhood to provide thorough and unbiased evaluations of applicants.

Ernie Pagan, an 11-year member of the Brotherhood, was hired by the council last year and assigned to work as an organizer in Connecticut.

Grady Eason has been a member of the union in Boston for almost ten years. He began work as a full-time organizer in the city earlier this year.

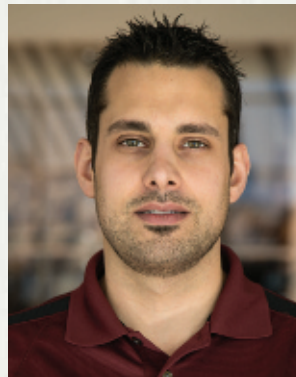
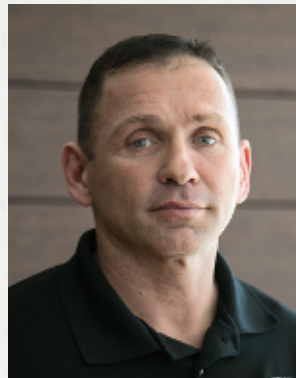
John Burrows has been working as part of the organizing team for Boston and Eastern Massachusetts since he was hired by the council. He has been a union carpenter for more than 17 years.

John Manning also has more than 17 years in the Brotherhood and was recently hired to work as a business agent for Carpenters Local 535.

Noel Xavier has been a union floor coverer for more than fifteen years. He recently joined his younger brother, Ricardo, as an organizer working in Boston and Eastern Massachusetts.

Harry Dow has been hired to develop business relationships between the union and health care facilities in the region. A union carpenter and former director of the New England Carpenters Combined Benefit Funds, Dow will promote the Infection Control Risk Assessment (ICRA) program, which promotes the use of carpenters who have been trained in the best practices for construction in health care facilities.

In early May, Al Peciaro announced that he was leaving his roles with NERCC to take a position with a signatory contractor. Peciaro had been a full-time staff member with NERCC since 1998. After serving as an organizer and organizing team leader, he worked in the Contractor Relations Department. At the same time, he served as executive director of the New England Carpenters Labor-Management Fund, including managing the council's Market Opportunity Fund. He was elected to the NERCC Executive Board, serving as vice president since 2013. He announced his resignation from the board, effective June 24, 2017.

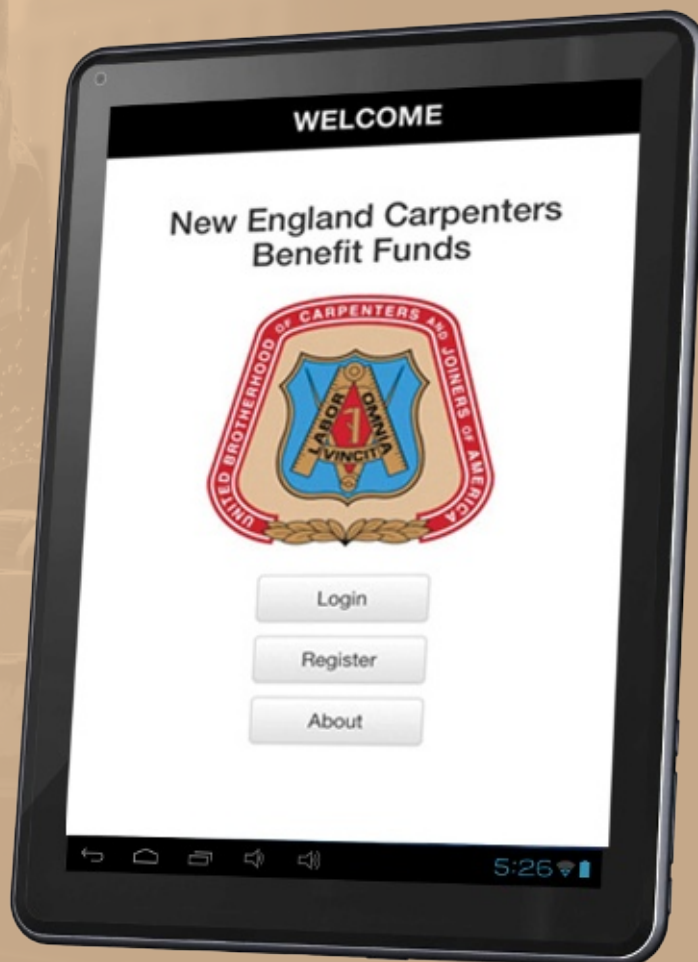

Benefit Information Always At Your Fingertips

The New England Carpenters Combined Benefit Funds has developed an online portal that puts benefit and profile-related data at the memberships' fingertips.

The mobile-first perspective effectively meets the members where they are as they move from job site to job site and as modern communicators where mobile access is expected (from smartphones, tablets, etc.).

Since the soft rollout in January, thousands of members have begun using it, becoming owners of their own data. Members using the mobile site have reported missing hours, identified changes and updates to profile data, and monitored their benefits information.

Not only does the site provide up-to-date information to members, it helps the Fund keep more accurate records for members

regarding addresses, birthdays, marital status and other information required to efficiently administer member benefits.

Members can register for an account by visiting carpentersfund.org and selecting member login. Registering to use the service only requires your UBC, EMP or OFC number, the last four digits of your Social Security number, your date of birth and a working email address.

SHOWCASING SKILLS ON TRENDY DESIGN CONCEPT

A small group of carpenters played an integral role in helping to construct the One Room Mansion exhibition, on display through early February, at the “BSA Space” in Boston. Working in collaboration with the Boston Society of Architects (BSA), a team of carpenters built a series of micro-units that comprise the One Room Mansion.

Local 218 member Chris Dwyer (foreground, facing page) was the lead carpenter foreman on the project, working directly with curator Aeron Hodges from Stantec. In addition to Dwyer, the volunteers on the project were Brothers Kevin Russell, Bryan Bartlett, Jr. and Dean LaCorcia of Local 218; Evan Garuti of Local 67; and Greg Quinn of Local 33. Dwyer is considered one of the union’s “.300 hitters,” having been selected to participate in the UBC’s Journeyman Leadership Program.

One Room Mansion explores the possibilities associated with individual living spaces grouped with generous communal amenities. Carpenters worked to help transform the BSA Space into a simulation of a co-living building with compact apartments connected by corridors. Practical living areas and innovative work, laundry, and storage space, as well as indoor and ‘outdoor’ common areas are highlighted.

BSA Space is Boston’s leading center for architecture and design, and is home to the Boston Society of Architects/AIA and the BSA Foundation.

UNCOVERING THE FACTS

CALLAHAN, INC.

THE TRUTH

QUINCY YMCA

Three years ago, the Quincy YMCA was built by Callahan, Inc. But since the first day of the building's opening, the roof leaked and continues to leak every time it rains or snows.

The YMCA opened in late December of 2013, seven months after its scheduled grand opening. In addition to the poor work on the roof, two workers completed statements against a Callahan subcontractor for wage theft while working on demolition of the old Quincy Y site in January 2015. Indications were that three other workers faced the same problems. Concerns were also raised about the possible mishandling of asbestos after it was found in the building.

Years since the building's opening, Callahan's irresponsible business practices are still evident in the quality of the building. It is clear that these are not the kind of business practices people want in their communities.



BY NOW EVERYONE HAS HEARD the message loud and clear that Callahan, Inc. is a disreputable contractor. The most recent bad news from Callahan put the safety of over 700 children on the line (story, opposite page). This season, the Carpenters union has been increasingly active with protests and actions by the membership and in winning victories with former Callahan subcontractors.

Each Thursday, rallies are being organized for a Callahan project in Cambridge. They have included massive turnouts of over 300 carpenters marching, blowing whistles, and chanting in unity against the underground economy. Regular demonstrations at their Assembly Square project in Somerville and Waltham have also been taking place.

The Sisters in the Brotherhood have also taken steps to challenge Callahan. On an early morning in April, a group of them gathered at the council to do a "mass application" to Callahan at the Assembly Row jobsite. Led by NERCC's Liz Skidmore, a line of over thirty female carpenters filed into the trailer. A mass application is a principled, public protest technique used in many situations to make a point to an employer, government body, or other entity that there is some form of inequality in the hiring process. That day the women carpenters were able to put Callahan superiors on guard, and we look forward to reporting further results soon.

CALLAHAN SUBS SAY "NO MORE"

The New England Regional Council of Carpenters and Universal Drywall, LLC of Auburn, New Hampshire, reached an agreement for the company to become a union contractor. The agreement followed months of discussions and will have a significant impact on the New England construction industry.

Universal is one of the larger drywall sub-contractors in the region. Established in 2002, the company has worked on large commercial and residential projects across the six New England states, including several for Callahan, Inc. Dozens of carpenters currently working for Universal are expected to join the union and begin earning union health, dental and retirement benefits. The company will have access to additional skilled manpower through the union, alleviating a major concern in the current construction industry.

Richard Pelletier, president of Universal, said the partnership with the union will help the company in multiple ways. "Our long-term objectives are customer-focused and worker-focused to ensure that our projects are completed on time and on budget with a workforce that excels, is loyal, well provided for in pay, pension and benefits, and treated fairly. We believe that this step in joining the Carpenters will allow us to enhance these objectives, and we look forward to partnering with the Carpenters in our future work, contributing to the economy, providing good jobs, and delivering excellent work."

NERCC also reached agreements with Force Corporation and its sister company National Framers, LLC, both of Lunenburg, Massachusetts, to become union contractors.

Force and National Framers are the largest open shop wood frame companies in New England and had been a contractor of choice for Callahan, Inc. Force was hit with a \$2.6 million fine for wage violations by the US Dept. of Labor last year. The principals subsequently made a decision to change their business model, operate legitimately, and now become union contractors.

"Force Corporation has decided to sign an agreement today with the New England Regional Council of Carpenters because we understand the challenges of the open shop sector and the opportunities in the union construction world," said Force President Claudio DaSilva. "We look forward to bidding in a level playing field environment and being able to provide the best union benefits and training to our employees. Our reputation on production and a 'get it done' attitude combined with the Carpenters organization should give us an advantage in the Eastern Massachusetts market."

The signing will have a lasting impact on the residential wood frame construction industry. It is another step in eliminating the underground economy and creating a level playing field for contractors in the residential market. It also means another large group of carpenters in New England will now be able to earn decent wages, get health insurance for their families and achieve retirement security.

This season carpenters have sent a message to Callahan, Inc. and all who uphold the underground economy: we are fighting back and we will not stay silent. And we are winning!

GAS LINE SEVERED, FORCING SCHOOL EVACUATION

More than 700 kids were put at risk in Fall River this January, when a four-inch gas line was ruptured during digging at a Callahan, Inc. construction site, The New Harbour Mall/South Coast Marketplace. Their families are learning why Callahan, Inc. is a serious problem and not just for those in the construction industry.

The severed line prompted an evacuation of the Alfred S. Letourneau Elementary School, located next door to the construction site. Students, faculty and staff were bused to a nearby high school.

Crews working for Callahan, Inc. ruptured the plastic gas main buried under the service road behind the South Coast Marketplace project and the Fall River Fire Department was called to the scene.

Fall River Fire Department District Chief Jeffrey Bacon said it was a "large, pressurized line," that ruptured and noted that he has "...never heard gas come out of a pipe like that...There was heavy gas flowing with the wind blowing toward the school. We pulled an alarm and evacuated the school" (The Fall River *Herald News*, January 5, 2017).

A little over a half hour after the rupture, crews from Liberty Gas were able to turn off the gas. Levels of gas were found in the school. Businesses around the project temporarily lost gas service as a result of the rupture.

At least a week after the gas line was ruptured, reports were that the project was still shut down and utility vehicles were on site conducting investigations.



— NH DEFEATS — ANTI-UNION — BILL AGAIN —

Last fall, Republicans in New Hampshire retook the Governor's office and maintained majorities in the legislature. National organizations opposed to unions moved to capitalize quickly by proposing "Right-to-Work" legislation.

But, as they have multiple times before in New Hampshire, union carpenters led a fight that beat back the bill by a 200-177 vote in the New Hampshire House of Representatives. The win was considered an upset, with Republican Governor Chris Sununu telling the media that he was "deeply disappointed."

NERCC Political Director Steve Joyce said the win was achieved the same way it was in past fights.

"Individual union carpenters made the difference," he said. "They made calls to other members and to their elected officials. In those calls and in meetings with their representatives, they

talked about themselves, their families and the negative impact this would have on them. When elected officials hear that personal message from constituents, it makes a difference."

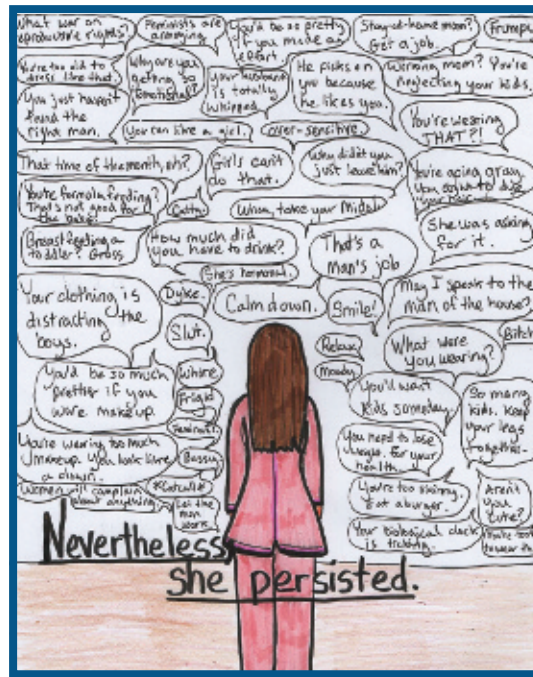
"Right-to-Work" legislation weakens unions by allowing people to enjoy the benefits of collective bargaining and representation by the union while making dues "optional." It is part of a long con to reduce the wages and working conditions for middle-class workers and to give employers that much more power over every workers' future. It has proven to be an effective weapon in achieving that goal virtually everywhere it has been enacted.

National "Right-to-Work" groups poured money and time into lobbying in New Hampshire, hoping to repeat victories in former union strongholds like Michigan, Missouri and Wisconsin.

Sisters in the Brotherhood Persist

In February, as Republicans were flexing their newly strengthened muscles in Washington, Massachusetts Senator Elizabeth Warren rose to speak on the nomination of Jeff Sessions as Attorney General.

Frustrated with her speech, Republicans invoked a rarely used rule to prohibit her from continuing. Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell would later defend the move saying, “She was warned. She was given an explanation. Nevertheless, she persisted.” His words struck a dismissive and condescending tone to many women, who feel Congress and the new administration have been hostile to women’s issues.

Artist Courtney Privett illustrated her reaction above, which went viral. It struck a chord with women trades workers across the country who are active in their unions. They contributed some of the things that have been said to them over the years for an adaptation of Privett’s work produced by Ellen Webber from NERCC. It features Carpenters Local 40 member Linda Oba.

The piece was shared and praised by Privett, who has a degree in engineering, a historically male-dominated field. It also got considerable attention on social media.

Infection Control Risk Assessment (ICRA) is a comprehensive training and certification program delivering the awareness and skills necessary to protect patients and avoid disruptions while building in active facilities.

Expanding and modernizing facilities is a necessary step for any successful health care operation. Although construction can be dirty, it doesn't have to endanger the safety and health of a hospital's patients and staff.

ICRA is a comprehensive training and certification program delivering the awareness and skills

The program was developed with leaders in the fields of construction and infection control and is delivered to union carpenters at all levels, from apprentices to journey level carpenters, foremen and superintendents.

At the same time, ICRA highlights the union's investment in skills training that maintains union carpenters as the most professional crafts workers in the industry,

the advantages contractors realize through a partnership with our union, and the responsiveness of the union to the needs of specific client markets.

Carpenters Make Nature More Accessible in Sudbury

Carpenters representing five Locals helped construct a boardwalk wandering nearly 1,500 feet through forested wetlands at the Great Meadows National Wildlife Refuge (NWR) in Sudbury, MA. The UPP project gave members the opportunity to lend their expertise on each phase of the boardwalk's construction.

The boardwalk runs through the Red Maple Trail, which is part of the Great Meadows National Wildlife Refuge trail network. Because of its proximity to the water, the trail provides great wildlife viewing opportunities to the public. Due to the nature of river floodplains, the trail floods a few times a year with lots of mud and roots outside of flooding events. This boardwalk provides year-round public access to this nature trail, including access for those with limited mobility, as access is linked directly to the parking lot.

The project involved leveling the posts and cross-boards to meet ADA accessibility standards, custom cutting and fitting the stringers to complete the frame between structures, layout of the decking and creating custom joints and angles to fit the boardwalk with safety bumpers.

"Not only were these carpenters able to bring their own techniques to the table, but they were also able to lead unskilled volunteers around them," notes Tim Puopolo, Great Meadows NWR Visitor Services Fellow, who led volunteer coordination on the project.

"Their caliber of work ensured that this boardwalk was indeed installed and walkable before the first flooding event of the year and we at Great Meadows NWR are very grateful."

The Training Verification Card (TVC) system revolves around a single plastic card featuring a QR code. One scan of the code gives employers an up-to-the-minute report from a database that is updated as soon as a member completes a course or earns a certification/qualification.

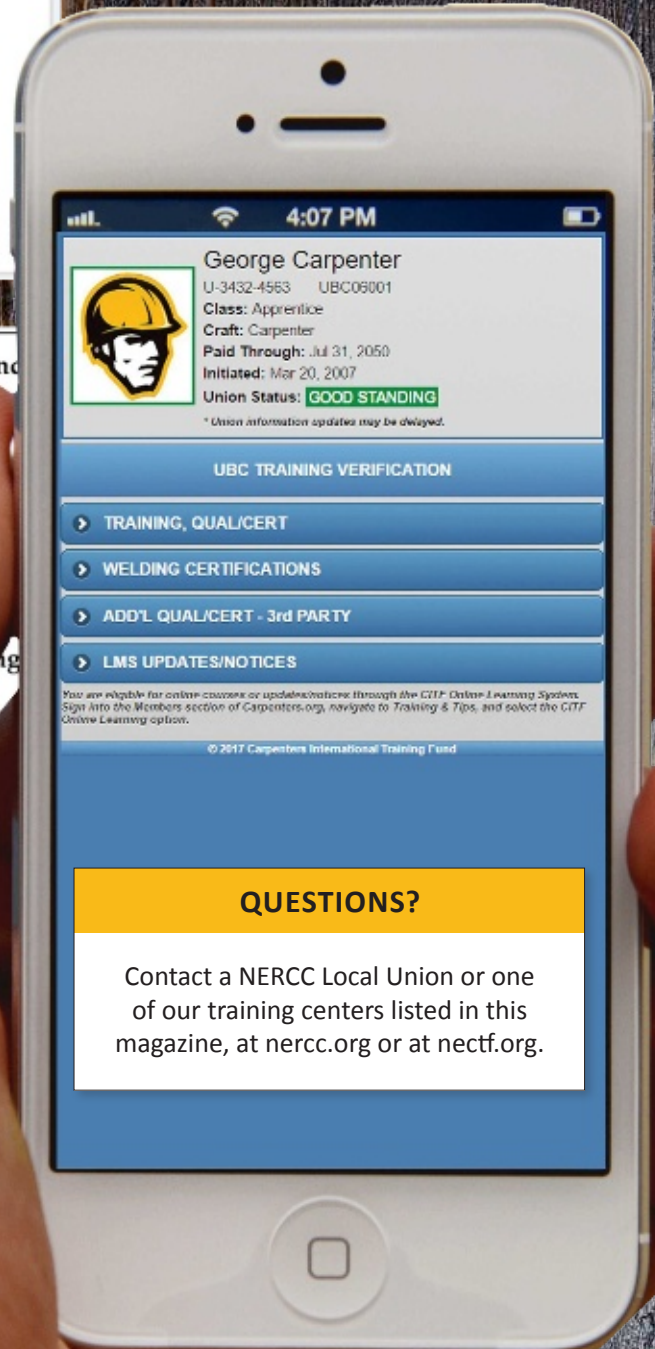

SOME VACATION CHECKS REMAIN UNCASHED

*Did you miss your vacation check last December?
Did you forget to cash it?*

On December 1, 2016, the New England Carpenters Combined Benefit Funds distributed 9,695 vacation checks to participants in the plan. Unfortunately, there are over 400 checks still uncashed. If you worked under a collective bargaining agreement with a vacation fund allocation between October 1, 2015, and September 30, 2016, and the fringe benefits were paid to the Funds prior to October 31, 2016, then you should have received a Vacation Fund distribution.

**If you have received your check, but have not cashed it,
then you need to be aware it expired May 30.**

If you did not cash your check, or did not request that your check be reissued in a timely manner, then the Funds, by policy, must enlist the assistance of a search company. If the search results in a member requesting their check be reissued, then there is a \$50.00 fee assessed against the Vacation disbursement. If you have not received your check, then the Fund Office may have an incorrect address for you or there could be another cause.

CARPENTERS BASIC TRAINING & Incentive Program



FALL PROTECTION

This 8-hour course addresses safety requirements when working from an elevated area such as stairs, ladders, scaffolds, aerial lifts and steel erection. It also addresses how to use, inspect and maintain personal protective equipment.



SCAFFOLD USER TRAINING

This 8-hour OSHA compliant course covers safety issues involved when using Scaffolding, including proper set up for fall protection. This certification is valid for 4 years from the date of completion.



FIRST AID, CPR, AED

This 16-hour certification course provides instruction in procedures for determining care and treatment for the injured or ill. This certification is valid for 2 years from the date of completion.



OSHA 30

This 30-hour construction safety course provides an in-depth view of the OSHA safety and health standards for the construction industry. Participants will learn about the rights and responsibilities of the employee and employer. A 30-hour OSHA certification card will be awarded upon successful completion of this course.

BASIC TRAINING

During negotiations for the last collective bargaining agreement for the Boston/Eastern Massachusetts, Northern New England and Rhode Island AGC, labor and management agreed on a "mandatory training and incentive program". Under these agreements, all carpenters, including foremen, are required to obtain the following certifications as a condition of employment: OSHA 30, Scaffold User Training, First Aid/CPR/AED, and Fall Protection.

Recognizing that this program involves a time commitment above and beyond hours on the job, an incentive component has been included in the program to recognize the efforts of the membership.

Members will receive a congratulatory package at the completion of the four-class requirement. The package includes a hooded sweatshirt, safety vest, long sleeve t-shirt, safety t-shirt, soft-sided cooler, drink koozie, a carpenter pencil, hardhat sticker and a 25' tape measure.
